Help! My Cat is Urinating Outside of the box—Part One

In the midst of today's hectic lifestyles, one of the many things that make cat companionship very attractive is the fact that cats relieve themselves in litter boxes. However, when they become inconsistent in this behavior, or stop using their litter pan entirely, it creates a situation which is stressful, disgusting and threatens to cost the cat its home. Most cats naturally seek soft, sandy litter and readily use their litter pans. There are many reasons that a normally well-behaved cat might suddenly have litter box problems. Some problems are medical and some are behavioral, and finding the underlying cause is the key to resolving the situation.

For many cats, the first signs of a bladder infection are urine accidents. Any cat that is urinating out of the box should have a thorough physical exam done by its veterinarian, and a sample of its urine evaluated for infection, crystal formation, and other problems. Male cats are prone to developing blockages in their urinary tract and becoming unable to urinate. Changes in their litter pan habits may be an early sign of this life-threatening problem. In older cats, urination outside of the box can be an indicator of metabolic diseases such as diabetes, kidney disease, high blood pressure or increased thyroid function. In addition, older cats often develop arthritis, and it may be difficult or painful for these cats to get in and out of the litter pan. Cats of all ages can develop painful bladder or kidney stones. Blood tests and x-rays may be necessary to identify the full extent of your cat's problem. Remember, Mother Nature made cats naturally secretive about their illnesses. A change in behavior, such as not using the litter box, may be your cat's way of telling you that there is a problem and he/she needs your help.

In most cases, resolving the underlying medical problems will result in your kitty returning to using his/her litter box. If your pet's examination and test results are normal, it is time to explore the behavioral reasons that may result in a cat not using the litter box. Next month we'll spend some time looking into these behavioral issues. Remember, the good news is that no matter what the

cause of the cat's inappropriate behavior, there are many things that can be done to help correct the situation. Both medical and behavioral problems can be addressed and treated successfully.

Laws of Physics as Applied to Cats

Tech Tips

Choosing Your Heartworm And Flea Preventative

We recommend that all cats be on heartworm preventative year round. Outdoor cats should be on flea preventative all year round due to exposure to rodents. Choices depend on what each individual cat's situation might be.

- ❑ **Revolution:** This is a topical parasiticide placed on the back of the neck once a month. It treats and prevents fleas, prevents heartworm disease, treats and controls ear mites, and treats and controls roundworms and hookworms. It is absorbed into the bloodstream, and 98% of fleas are killed within 36 hours. Calendar stickers are included to help remind you when the next dose is due. It remains effective after bathing and exposure to rain. Revolution, although a little more costly, is the product of choice for both indoor and outdoor cats because of its wide range of parasite control.
- ❑ **Heartgard:** Oral chewable tablet given once a month. Can be given as a treat or mixed into canned food if necessary. It prevents heartworm disease, and treats and prevents hookworms. It is also absorbed into the bloodstream and can be safely combined with Advantage or Frontline to control fleas. Stickers are included for your calendar.
- ❑ **Advantage:** Topical parasiticide applied on the back of the neck once a month for control and prevention of fleas. Kills 98-100% of fleas in 12 hours. New fleas are killed within 2 hours. It is absorbed into the fatty layer under the skin, and

remains effective after bathing and exposure to rain. Stickers provided to place on calendar to remind you of the next dose.

- ❑ Frontline: Topical parasiticide applied on the back of the neck once a month for control and treatment of fleas and ticks. It is also absorbed into the fatty layer under the skin and remains effective after bathing and exposure to rain. Also comes with stickers.
- ❑ Capstar: Oral tablets that are absorbed into the bloodstream and lasts for 24 hours only. It kills fleas within 2 hours. Can be combined with other flea treatments for fast knock down of flea populations.

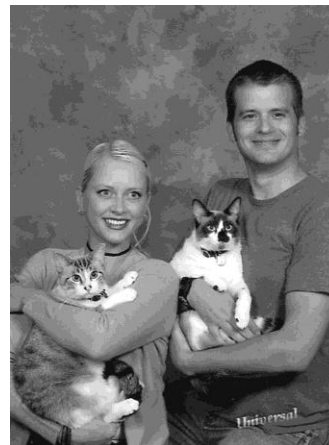
Cats and People
